Dear parents/carers,

How quickly seven weeks have past, I can't believe that we are at the half term point already! We have had a wonderful first half term and the children have made some incredible progress in their learning; we are all very proud of them. It has been so good to be able to ease some of the restrictions that we have had in place of the last couple of years and we are grateful to the support and consideration of our school family for keeping us all as safe and well as possible, thank you.

We are regularly holding whole school Worship and Celebration Assemblies but outside and we have loved having Open the Book and Father Phillip back at school. Again, we are thankful for their willingness to lead these outside (and via Zoom still if necessary).

Recently, we welcomed the WREN community folk group to our school. The day started with a short introduction to folk music, the tales and songs collected by Sabine Baring-Gould. As a school, we have historical and geographical links with Baring-Gould's legacy within and around the village of Lewdown and Lew Trenchard, including his family home of Lew Trenchard Manor and connections to St Peter's Church.

Throughout the day, each class were immersed into music and song during a singing workshop with professional folk singer Paul Wilson, as well as a tunes workshop with professional musicians. The children had the opportunity to explore and experience a range of tuned instruments and collaborate as a band to perform a short piece of music.

Our enrichment day ended with a short performance of achievements and celebration. Our children have been inspired by the enrichment day which has ignited curiosity for musical instruments, singing and our local heritage. Many thanks to Mrs Sutherland for organising this event and to the FLS for funding it. We plan to make this an annual event.

We are also excited to inform you that the Andaras Multi-Academy Trust has successfully secured the purchase of the site next to the school, previously belonging to Mr Worth, more details to follow.

Finally, we would like to wish you all a safe and restful half term break, we look forward to welcoming you all back on Monday 1st November.

School improvement:

Over the last two weeks, we have had visits from our Academy Improvement Officers, Mrs Saunders and Mr Swait. Mrs Saunders visited with our Early Years Trust leader, Mrs Jones, to look at our Early Years and Key Stage One provision, focusing mainly upon the new Early Years Framework. Both of our visitors commented very positively on the hard work that our team have put into developing the classroom environments, both inside and out. They were very impressed how calm and engaged the children were, even when the whole class were outside in Continuous Provision. Their play was clearly purposeful and the learning evident to see. They also commented on the clear

The visit was hugely positive and provided us with some useful ideas and next steps as well. Our visitors also "Magpied" some ideas and examples of good practice to share with other schools in our Trust.

Mr Swait visited to look at writing and again, his report was extremely positive. He could see how hard staff and pupils are working to address gaps in learning due to the last couple of disrupted years. He also spoke to some of our pupils and was very impressed with their confidence and understanding of what they are learning and how they are learning it.

Internal monitoring has focused on visiting writing lessons, looking at writing books and maths books.

This week, phonics assessments have also been undertaken and the progress is staggering. Mrs Laithwaite has also conducted a vocabulary assessment for our Reception pupils, which was also brilliant. These assessments are to inform our provision and teaching and is used for internal purposes only at this stage.

Mrs Thorp has begun her ELSA (Emotional Literacy Support Assistants) training, which will continue over the next few months.

Mrs McMorrow and Mrs Oakes have signed up for Emotional Logic training, which will begin in the new year.

School attendance and absence

Going to school regularly is important for your child's future. Parents are responsible for making sure their children receive full-time education. Parents are legally responsible for making sure that children attend school. If your child doesn't go to school, you could get fined or prosecuted.

Benefits of school attendance

Good attendance at school is not just beneficial, it's essential. Attending school is directly linked to improved exam performance which should in turn lead to further learning opportunities and better job prospects. As well as this, going to school helps to develop:

- Friendships
- Social skills
- Team values
- Life skills

• Cultural awareness

Career pathways

Absence from school

• All schools must record details of pupils' attendance and absence at school. They do this at the beginning of morning and afternoon sessions meaning that each day your child receives two half day marks.

• If your child is going to be absent from school, (e.g. for an unavoidable appointment) then you should let the school know as soon as possible. If your child has been absent due to an unexpected event such as bereavement or illness then you must also let the school know on the first day of absence in accordance with the school's attendance policy.

• The school will then record the absence. If you fail to notify the school as to why your child has not been present then the school may record that period of absence as being unauthorised.

• The Education Welfare Service (EWS) has access to all attendance information for each pupil and if your child is missing school without good reason, schools and the EA have the authority to find out why.

Attendance in figures

• Schools will advise parents of a child's attendance levels at least once a year. This will usually include a percentage attendance figure.

• Achieving 90 per cent in an exam or test is a fantastic result but if your child is at school for only 90 per cent of the school year then they will have missed 19 days - almost four whole weeks of school.

• For primary-age children, this can mean almost 120 guided learning hours. This is a big gap for any child to make up.

• If your child is a pupil at post-primary school, 120 guided learning hours is the equivalent of studying one full-time GCSE (normally taken over two years).

How to prevent your child from missing school

You can help prevent your child missing school by:

• having a routine from an early age and sticking it to it

• making sure your child understands the importance of good attendance and punctuality

- making sure they understand the possible implications for themselves and you as a parent if they don't attend

• taking an interest in their education - ask about school work and encourage them to get involved in school activities

• discussing any problems they may have at school and letting their teacher or Head Teacher know about anything that is causing concern

• not letting them take time off school for minor ailments or holidays during term time To avoid disrupting your child's education, you should arrange (as far as possible), appointments and outings:

• after school hours

• at weekends

during school holidays

Term time holidays

• Term time holidays have been increasing over the last number of years. Parents should make every effort to ensure that their child does not miss school due to holiday plans. Schools are not obliged to agree to you taking your child on holiday during term time. They are entitled to record such holidays as being an unauthorised absence

Support for parents

• As a parent, if you find it hard to talk to your child about their attendance at school or other school-related matters, support is available.

Support from your child's school

• Your child's school should have an attendance policy in place and made available to you, normally from the school website. As a parent or guardian, you should ensure that you adhere to the guidance provided in that policy regarding attendance and notifying absence.

• Your child's school is the first place to discuss any attendance problems. The school should try to agree a plan with you to improve your child's attendance.

• A school can refer your child to the Education Welfare Service (EWS) if they feel there is reason to be concerned at their level of attendance. The EWS is a specialist education support service which helps young people of a compulsory school age and their families to get the best out of the education system. The EWS can offer advice and support to help you and your child to have good attendance at school Support from the Education Authority

The Education Authority (EA) can also help if you are struggling to make sure that your child goes to school

Support from other organisations

As well as school and the EA, you may also be able to get advice and assistance from other organisations. These may include your local community centre or local community group. ParentingNI

provide a wide range of helpful advice and resources as well as a parent's helpline.

<u>School Dinners</u> – Please can all Dinners be paid in advance of at least a week via School Money * <u>Sickness and</u> <u>diarrhoea</u> - If your child experiences an upset stomach, they should be kept off school for a minimum of 48hrs, in order to minimise the spread the illnesses * <u>Morning drop-off</u> - Children should be at school in time for the bell at 8.45am. If your child is ill, or will be in late, please could you make sure that you contact school (01566 783 273) so we can inform class teachers. If your child is not in school by 9.15am, and we have not received a message, they could be registered as late, and this will affect their attendance * <u>Wet Weather Coats</u> - please ask that all children come to school with appropriate outdoor clothing – water proof coats for all children please, and wellies. * <u>Comments for Governors</u> - If you have any comments or suggestions for the school Governors these can be placed in the black box outside of the gate



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
