School Improvement:

Mr Payton has had a very busy fortnight, as he leads two key subjects in school, maths and PE. Last week he attended a PE subject leader training day and this week he has been carrying out lesson visits in maths. He has loved seeing pupils across the school developing their fluency, reasoning and problem skills.

Mrs Sutherland, Mr Elliott and Mr Payton have been speaking to pupils in each class about their learning in their subjects, not just what they learn but how and what strategies they use to help them. This is a useful way of informing the team what the children think about their learning. All our monitoring this term informs the action plans for each subject which the subject leaders write on a yearly basis. These run from January to January and link to our whole school and Trust improvement plans for the year. We will be asking parents for their views during the Spring Term via a parent/carer questionnaire. As always, if you have any questions about your child's learning, please contact their class teacher via Class Dojo. Thank you.

Mrs McMorrow has completed her three-day Health and Safety training and passed the exam with flying colours, well done!

Mrs Thorp has attended another ELSA training day.

Mrs McMorrow, Mrs Oakes and Miss Prynne will all be accessing Emotional Logic training in January. This course is being organised by Devon Virtual School and will run virtually over several weeks as well as requiring candidates to complete study independently.

Grammar term of the fortnight:

Word classes:

Words have different purposes in sentences, depending on their word class or part of speech.

A word can be belong to more than one word class, depending on its position and purpose in a sentence.

In school, we often ask the children to consider the job of the word, its purpose to help then to classify words correctly. This can be complex at times and we often have meaningful discussions to justify our thought processes.

This fortnight, we continue to focus on nouns.

Concrete nouns:

A concrete noun identifies things which can be physically seen or touched.

Maggie ate her toast in the kitchen. She could see the blue sky out of the window.

The noun Maggie identifies the person. The noun toast identifies the thing. The noun kitchen identifies the place.

Abstract nouns:

An abstract noun identifies things which cannot be physically touched or seen, such as a state, idea, process or feeling.

My dream is to make progress.

The noun dream identifies an idea. The noun progress identifies a process.

This situation caused great anger.

The noun situation identifies a state. The noun anger identifies a feeling.

Abstract nouns are used especially in more formal language.

More formal:

The man's inability to distinguish right from wrong caused great suffering.

Home Learning

As you are aware, over the last couple of years we have stream-lined the home learning policy to provide consistency across the school and to be as effective and useful as possible.

We decided to focus on key skills that children need throughout their lives such as reading, spelling and times tables. Learning the facts from the knowledge organisers also enables them to access deeper learning in non-core subjects which is so beneficial as the National Curriculum is extensive and the school day is limiting time wise.

In Brentor, the focus is reading as this is the most important skill for all learning. The children in Brentor do have log ins for Spelling Shed if they would like to participate, but there isn't an expectation to.

However, as pupils move into Fox Tor, we expect to see them accessing TTRS and Spelling Shed as well as using their knowledge organisers and daily reading. We understand that when they begin Year 2, they might find TTRS challenging, so we suggest practicing on Hit the Button until they learn the 2, 5 and 10 times tables. From Year 3 to Year 6, unless there is a specific need or agreed arrangement between teachers and parents, the expectation is reading, knowledge organisers, Spelling Shed and TTRS. If you have any issues accessing the online platforms, we are happy to support this in school. Please contact your child's class teacher.

We would like to thank everyone for their continued support with our fundraising activities. The table top sale was a great success and we look forward to organising more activities like this. We are continuing with our raffles on Facebook and have many more excited prizes lined up. Going to school regularly is important for your child's future. Parents are responsible for making sure their children receive full-time education. Parents are legally responsible for making sure that children attend school. If your child doesn't go to school, you could get fined or prosecuted.

Benefits of school attendance

Good attendance at school is not just beneficial, it's essential. Attending school is directly linked to improved exam performance which should in turn lead to further learning opportunities and better job prospects. As well as this, going to school helps to develop:

- Friendships
- Social skills
- Team values
- Life skills
- Cultural awareness
- Career pathways

Absence from school

• All schools must record details of pupils' attendance and absence at school. They do this at the beginning of morning and afternoon sessions meaning that each day your child receives two half day marks.

• If your child is going to be absent from school, (e.g. for an unavoidable appointment) then you should let the school know as soon as possible. If your child has been absent due to an unexpected event such as bereavement or illness then you must also let the school know on the first day of absence in accordance with the school's attendance policy.

• The school will then record the absence. If you fail to notify the school as to why your child has not been present then the school may record that period of absence as being unauthorised.

• The Education Welfare Service (EWS) has access to all attendance information for each pupil and if your child is missing school without good reason, schools and the EA have the authority to find out why.

Attendance in figures

• Schools will advise parents of a child's attendance levels at least once a year. This will usually include a percentage attendance figure.

• Achieving 90 per cent in an exam or test is a fantastic result but if your child is at school for only 90 per cent of the school year then they will have missed 19 days - almost four whole weeks of school.

• For primary-age children, this can mean almost 120 guided learning hours. This is a big gap for any child to make up.

• If your child is a pupil at post-primary school, 120 guided learning hours is the equivalent of studying one full-time GCSE (normally taken over two years).

How to prevent your child from missing school

You can help prevent your child missing school by:

- having a routine from an early age and sticking it to it
- making sure your child understands the importance of good attendance and punctuality

- making sure they understand the possible implications for themselves and you as a parent if they don't attend

• taking an interest in their education - ask about school work and encourage them to get involved in school activities

• discussing any problems they may have at school and letting their teacher or Head Teacher know about anything that is causing concern

• not letting them take time off school for minor ailments or holidays during term time To avoid disrupting your child's education, you should arrange (as far as possible), appointments and outings:

• after school hours

• at weekends

during school holidays

Term time holidays

• Term time holidays have been increasing over the last number of years. Parents should make every effort to ensure that their child does not miss school due to holiday plans. Schools are not obliged to agree to you taking your child on holiday during term time. They are entitled to record such holidays as being an unauthorised absence

Support for parents

• As a parent, if you find it hard to talk to your child about their attendance at school or other school-related matters, support is available.

Support from your child's school

• Your child's school should have an attendance policy in place and made available to you, normally from the school website. As a parent or guardian, you should ensure that you adhere to the guidance provided in that policy regarding attendance and notifying absence.

• Your child's school is the first place to discuss any attendance problems. The school should try to agree a plan with you to improve your child's attendance.

• A school can refer your child to the Education Welfare Service (EWS) if they feel there is reason to be concerned at their level of attendance. The EWS is a specialist education support service which helps young people of a compulsory school age and their families to get the best out of the education system. The EWS can offer advice and support to help you and your child to have good attendance at school Support from the Education Authority

The Education Authority (EA) can also help if you are struggling to make sure that your child goes to school

Support from other organisations

As well as school and the EA, you may also be able to get advice and assistance from other organisations. These may include your local community centre or local community group. ParentingNI

provide a wide range of helpful advice and resources as well as a parent's helpline.

<u>School Dinners</u> – Please can all Dinners be paid in advance of at least a week via School Money * <u>Sickness and</u> <u>diarrhoea</u> - If your child experiences an upset stomach, they should be kept off school for a <u>minimum of 48hrs</u>, in order to minimise the spread the illnesses * <u>Morning drop-off</u> - Children should be at school in time for the bell at 9am.
