Subject	Art and Design
Overall Curriculum	The school's curriculum for Art and Design is based on the revised 2014 National Curriculum, which links directly to the Scottish Borders Scheme of work, and the school's Design and Technology curriculum where links can be made between the two disciplines. We believe that the teaching and learning of Art and Design provides a valuable educational, social and cultural experience for all pupils. The learning of Art and Design provides a medium for cross-curricular links and for the reinforcement of knowledge, skills and development in other subjects.
Pedagogy	Teaching and Learning  Art, Craft and Design embody some of the highest forms of human creativity. A high-quality art and design education will engage, inspire and challenge pupils, equipping them with the knowledge and skills to experiment, invent and create their own works of art, craft and design. As pupils progress, they will be able to think critically and develop a more rigorous understanding of art and design. They will also know how art and design both reflects and shapes our history, and contributes to the culture, creativity and wealth of our nation.  Our expectation is that the majority of pupils will move through the programmes of study at broadly the same pace. Our pedagogy is that children should learn skills, develop methods and have strategies to tackle Art and Design in a range of situations and contexts including the use of a wide range of media. This begins in the EYFS as we believe that early acquisition of Art and Design knowledge leads to greater success as pupils move through the school.
	<ul> <li>Support and scaffolding is provided in all Art and Design lessons and is done in various ways, such as:</li> <li>setting challenging age-related tasks based on accurate assessment of pupils' prior skills, knowledge and understanding;</li> <li>timely support and intervention; systematically and effectively checking pupils' understanding throughout lessons;</li> <li>ensuring that constructive feedback is personal, frequent and of a consistently high quality – enabling pupils to understand how to improve and develop their work - with planned in time for children to respond to feedback.</li> </ul>
Assessment	Assessment is regarded as an integral part of teaching and learning and is a continuous process. It is the responsibility of the class teacher to assess all pupils in their class. This is mainly achieved through mini-plenaries, questioning, marking, T.A. feedback and pupil self-assessment. Teachers assess children's progress informally during the lessons, evaluating progress against the outcomes stated within the units. Pupils are more formally assessed at the end of each unit and the end of each term.

Art is assessed within the four areas of:

- Skills (generating ideas: skills of designing and developing ideas)
- Making (skills of making art, craft and design)
- Evaluating (skills of judgement and evaluation)
- Knowledge and understanding (acquiring and applying knowledge to inform progress)

## Culture

## **Systems** The school's policy for Art and Design is based on the revised 2014 National Curriculum, which links directly to the Scottish Borders Scheme of work.
